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FOREWORD

The FSA's Performance in the 4th Quarter of 2019/20 saw good progress being made against the priorities for the year set by the Board.

During the 4th quarter the FSA has re-prioritised to ensure food remains to be safe and what it says it is during the COVID-19 outbreak. The impact of COVID-19 on the FSA's 2020/21 priorities and resources will be discussed by Business Committee in a separate paper. The impact of COVID-19 had minimal impact on this quarter's report, however there will be a more significant impact seen in the 1st quarter ending June 2020.

On EU Exit, whilst accepting the profound impacts of COVID-19, ensuring FSA's readiness for the end of the EU Transition period remains the FSA's highest priority Programme. To mitigate the impact of COVID-19, the FSA has reviewed and prioritised its activities within the EU Transition Programme, to ensure those projects with the most activity still remain and with highest relative impact of outstanding work retain the necessary resources. As such these activities remain broadly on track. However, the continued impact of COVID 19 on factors outside the control of the FSA, e.g. timescales for negotiation, development of physical infrastructure at borders, will make delivery increasingly more challenging.

On the FSA's 2nd strategic priority of regulatory reform Achieving Business Compliance (ABC) Programme, there continues to be good progress.

At the end of March 2020 152 Local Authorities had signed up to the "Register a food business" (RAFB) service, with more than 9,000 new businesses registered using it. The FSA therefore exceeded it's ambition to sign up 150 Local Authorities by the end of quarter four.

The FSA's headline outcome-based ambition is measured annually through the number of human cases of foodborne disease (slide 5), 2019 saw a reduction on the 4 pathogens included in the report. The FSA continues to partner with national surveillance bodies and other relevant stakeholders to ensure that we have fully examined all available data to understand any underlying issues. It should be noted that there's always some annual variation in the incidence of foodborne disease. Because of this expected variation, the FSA Board sets baseline levels which are the thresholds for action, and all 4 pathogens in 2019 were below these thresholds, so no further action is deemed necessary at the moment. The FSA plays a key role working with delivery partners to ensure food businesses fulfil their responsibility of ensuring food is safe and what it says it is.

The number of open local authority performance management cases (slide 8) remains unchanged for this quarter. We have given detailed direction to all local authorities on responding to the COVID-19 pandemic and are conscious of the significant impact on delivery of planned interventions programmes in 2020/21.

The FSA has closely managed its resources, and has kept within all HMT limits in the year ending 31 March 2020. The additional £3m provided by HMT in Q2 to fund a possible no-deal exit from EU was not needed and makes up the EU Exit underspend. Programme underspend was primarily due to increased income from changes to the charge rate and the FSA re-prioritising resources to ensure EU exit readiness, which resulted in some delays to important but non-urgent Science expenditure. COVID-19 means that the FSA's balanced budget for 20-21 is now being reprioritised which is covered in a separate paper. The FSA continues to prepare for SR20 which expected to cover the financial period from 2021/22 to 2023/24.








UK Recognition of FHRS Stickers


between Nov 2014 - October 2019 (England, Wales and Northern Ireland consolidated)




% of surveyed people recognise the FHRS sticker as at October 2019 by country






% of food businesses within the scope of FHRS with a rating of 5 as at 31 March 2020 by country




These are cases where performance issues were identified on the basis of the 2017/18 LAEMS data and 2018/19 LAEMS data. Local authorities are asked to provide a suitable time bound action plan to secure the required improvements.

Where action is not taken by a local authority or where improvements are not sustained, we follow an escalation procedure so that public health is protected, and consumer confidence maintained - a staged approach is taken to engage involving increasingly senior levels of management within the local authority and the FSA as required, as well as other government bodies if appropriate.
